

Aurora Global Income Trust (ASX Code: AIB) Performance Report - February 2013

Summary

- The Trust had another strong performance in February
- The Trust returned 2.7% for the month compared to the UBS Australia Bank Bill Index which returned 0.2%
- For the year to the end of February, the Trust returned of 8.6% which is materially above the UBS Australia Bank Bill

The above composite/hybrid performance summary reflects a combination of the performance of the investment strategy as it applied (net of fees) within the former Aurora Sandringham Global Income Trust (ARSN 131 291 499 - now terminated) since its inception in July 2008 to 30 November 2010, and then the performance of this Trust (which implemented the same strategy) since 30 November 2010 to date. This is not the actual performance of Aurora Global Income Trust (AIB). The actual return of AIB since inception is 4.0% p.a. The table above and the charts below refer to the performance of the composite/hybrid strategy and not of the actual performance of AIB.

Investment Objective*

To provide investors with steady income returns after fees and expenses in excess of the UBS Australia Bank Bill Index over rolling three year periods while protecting their capital. Please note that while we aim to achieve this objective, the returns are not guaranteed.

Investment Strategy

To take advantage of global companies that Aurora expects will increase in value relative to the market around the announcement of their quarterly, half-yearly and yearly earnings results while hedging their market and currency exposure.

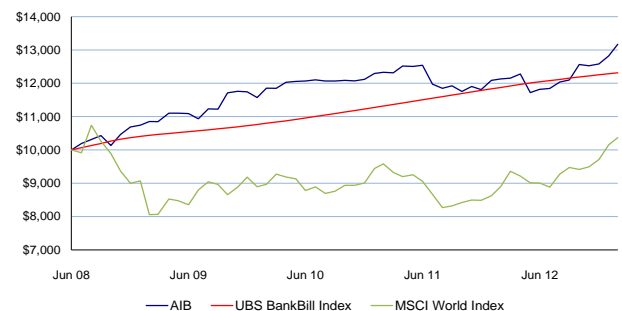

Portfolio Commentary

Global markets fluctuated between positive and negative territory before ending February relatively flat. While the US finished the month with upward momentum other regions weren't as strong, particularly Europe where concerns of political instability came to the forefront of investor attention. The MSCI World Total Return rose in AUD terms due to the translation gain on a weaker Australian Dollar, with a cooling Chinese manufacturing sector being the primary catalyst for its short term weakness.

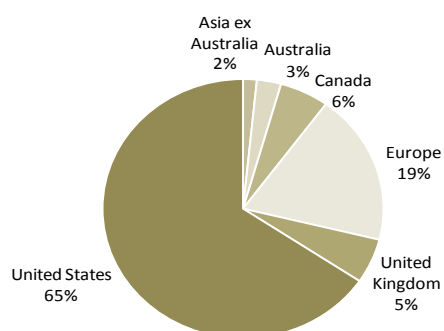
For companies reporting in February, both Heinz (+19.5%) and Dollar Tree (+13.4%) were leading performers. Heinz was a takeover target of Warren Buffett's Berkshire Hathaway whilst Dollar Tree, the US discount retailer, jumped after announcing particularly strong profit numbers to end 2012. Alternatively, telecommunications firm Centurylink (-16.7%) and Tobacco maker Swedish Match (-13.3%) were large underperformers. Centurylink surprised analysts by slashing its dividend and proposing to reshape its capital structure through debt leverage. Swedish Match released low profit numbers and further disappointed with its future guidance. Both companies had high analyst support prior to February.

The overall monthly performance of the Trust was 2.7% which was another outstanding result relative to the Trust's Benchmark.
