

Performance Report - November 2015

Summary

- The Trust under-performed the cash benchmark returning -0.60% in November 2015.
- This is the Trust's first negative return this year.
- The Trust has produced improved performance over the past 12 months by returning 8.87% and outperforming cash by 6.70% over the same period.

The above composite/hybrid performance summary reflects a combination of the performance of the investment strategy as it applied (net of fees) within the former Aurora Sandringham Global Income Trust (ARSN 131 291 499 - now terminated) since its inception in July 2008 to 30 November 2010, and then the performance of this Trust (which implemented the same strategy) since 30 November 2010 to date. This is not the actual performance of Aurora Global Income Trust (AIB). The actual return of AIB since inception is 3.38% p.a. The table above and the charts below refer to the performance of the composite/hybrid strategy and not of the actual performance of AIB.

Investment Objective*

The Trust aims to achieve absolute returns (i.e. positive returns in both rising and falling equity markets) by using a number of different global investment strategies that allows the performance of the Trust to have very little correlation to the performance of global equity market indices. The focus on 'absolute returns' differs from traditional funds in that the Trust aims to produce positive returns regardless of equity market conditions.

Investment Strategy

The Investment Manager has a wide discretion over the investments that may be held by the Trust. The pursuit of a diverse range of global investment strategies means that the Trust's returns are not necessarily dependent on any stock markets' direction, or dependent on any specific assumption or key market parameter. The Trust does not seek to replicate the standard industry benchmarks.

The Trust seeks to take advantage of companies that are expected to increase in value relative to the market around the announcement of their quarterly, half-yearly and yearly earnings results, while hedging their market and currency exposure.

In selecting additional investments for the Trust, the Manager follows a rigorous investment selection process which includes detailed qualitative and fundamental research.

The Trust may use derivatives for risk management as well as to create new positions. The Trust may opportunistically short sell securities that are considered to be overpriced in the anticipation of purchasing them later at lower prices for a profit and/or to reduce risk on the overall portfolio.

Portfolio Commentary

Global markets were relatively subdued in November with early falls followed by an end of month rally to leave most indices around flat. Europe continued to impress with the Eurostoxx 50 up 2.6%. The S&P500 finished flat whilst Hong Kong's Hang Seng Index was down 2.8%. Commodities were hammered (again) with spot WTI Oil down 12.3% and Iron Ore down 14.7%. The Volatility Index (VIX) closed up 1 point to 17. The chances of the Fed tightening in December (for the first time in 9 years) increased markedly with further impressive economic data, particularly on the jobs front.

The Trust was down 0.6% for the month. This is the Trust's first negative month for the year and the Trust is up 8.87% year to date (compared to RBA Cash averaging 2.1% year to date and the MSCI Barra Index up 0.9% year to date).

The Earning's Announcement strategy was a large detractor for the month (-0.8%). The Trust continues to avoid commodities related exposures. These are largely filtered out during the quantitative process, however opportunities which pass this process are heavily scrutinised on a qualitative basis. Losses were not sector specific, however European investments far outperformed U.S. investments. The divergence in monetary policy between these jurisdictions is concerning and provides a good retrofit explanation. The reality however is that firms typically outperform during tightening cycles as central banks react to increased profits, inflation and credit expansion.

Other strategies produced modest returns. The Trust took opportunities in the Long/Short and Convergence strategies to invest in companies trading at a discount to cash and/or marketable securities. Using a similar approach several Yield investments were made. The Trust intends to actively manage positions and monitor management and shareholder activity to achieve profitable outcomes. The Trust currently hedges market exposure (outside the Earning's Announcement strategy) with short futures positions as well as opportunistic short trades in single stocks. We see volatility as evenly priced (VIX at 17) heading into the festive season, however short term shocks from commodity price movements and the Federal Reserve monetary policy should not be ignored.

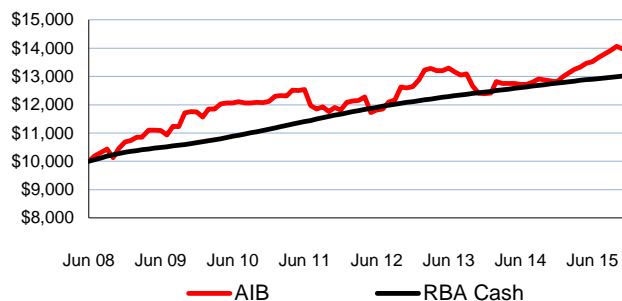
